Lehigh Valley doctor to head physician organization

Stock Keister currently maintains a clinical practice with Lehigh Valley Physicians Group at a large office in downtown Allentown, combining her medical director responsibilities with teaching and clinical care. Her husband, Drew Keister, is also a family physician with Lehigh Valley Health Network. They have two adolescent daughters with whom they enjoy supporting the U.S. Women's National Soccer Team.

As president, Stock Keister will act as the PAFP's spokeswoman and the face of the family physician community to local, state, and national media. She will be responsible for appointing all standing and special commissions and committees.
